1 ADMINISTRATION BLDG  

Built in 1898, the "Ad" Building is Gonzaga's oldest and most storied hall. It houses most of Gonzaga's main administrative offices, including Admissions, Financial Aid, Registrar, Student Life, and Public Relations. It also serves as one of Gonzaga's primary classroom buildings. Russell Theatre occupies the east end of the first floor, and the recently renovated University Chapel, with its beautiful stained glass windows, occupies the east end of the third floor.

2 BISHOP WHITE SEMINARY


This mansion was originally constructed in 1897 by John Huetter as a private residence. Huetter, a contractor, worked on several of the University's early construction projects including the Administration Building. It has served for many years as the residence and training center for Diocesan seminarians pursuing their undergraduate studies at the University.

3 BROADCAST STUDIES/JOURNALISM 

This building became home to the broadcast studies and journalism programs in 2004. It houses Gonzaga's TV studio where students create their own TV productions, and it is also home to the University's student-run radio station, KAGU.

4 CATALDO HALL 

Named for Gonzaga's founder, Fr. Joseph Cataldo, S.J., this building hosts many student activities including dances, coffee houses, and other social events in the Globe Room. Cataldo also houses Pandini's Italian Restaurant, and Jazzman's Coffee Stand.

5 CENTER FOR COMMUNITY ACTION & SERVICE LEARNING (CCASL) HOUSE 

Through CCASL Gonzaga students donate more than 100,000 volunteer hours to the community every year. For example, through Campus Kids, Gonzaga students mentor elementary school children in the Gonzaga neighborhood. Additionally, many academic departments use CCASL to provide students with service-learning opportunities.

6 COG  

Built in 1953, the COG houses the Bookstore, Spike's Café, Sub Connection sandwich shop, and Gonzaga's primary dining hall, The Marketplace, operated by Sodexo Food Services. The COG is an acronym for Circulus Omnium Gonzaga-orum, or translated from Latin "meeting place of Gonzaga." Unofficially, the COG is also known as the "Center of Gonzaga."

7 CROSBY STUDENT CENTER  

The Crosby Student Center is home to the Crosby Café, the mailroom, a credit union branch, and numerous club offices and meeting rooms. Built in 1957 through contributions from alumnus Bing Crosby, the Crosby Center originally served as Gonzaga's library until 1992 when the Foley Center opened. At that time, Crosby was transformed into a student center. Two hundred of Bing's artifacts are housed in the Crosbyanna Room, including 20 gold and 2 platinum records.

8 CROSBY ALUMNI HOUSE

This childhood home of Bing Crosby now houses Gonzaga's Alumni offices. Crosby and his family moved to Spokane when Bing was 3, and he attended GU for three-and-a-half years (1920-1924) before he left to pursue his singing and acting career in Hollywood.

9 FOLEY CENTER  

Opened in 1992, the Foley Center is named for longtime Spokane County Superior Court Judge and alumnus Ralph E. Foley and his pioneer wife, Helen Higgins Foley, the parents of Gonzaga alumnus Thomas S. Foley, former Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives. The Foley Center serves as Gonzaga's primary library. Through a consortium of northwest libraries, Foley Center makes available hard-bound and electronic resources worldwide. The Rare Book Room holds manuscripts dating back to the 1400s, and the Media Center lends multi-media equipment for class projects.

10 HERAK CENTER  

Originally built in 1948 and extensively expanded and upgraded, the Herak Center serves as home to Gonzaga's School of Engineering, which offers degrees in civil, computer, electrical, mechanical, and general engineering. The School of Engineering is also developing an Electric Utility Transmission and Distribution Line program. Additionally, the building houses the departments of physics, mathematics, and computer science.

11 HOPKINS HOUSE 

Home to Gonzaga's Honors Program, Hopkins House is named for the 19th century Jesuit poet and writer Gerard Manley Hopkins, S.J. The Foley Center houses a significant collection of Hopkins' works.

12 HUGHES HALL  

Hughes Hall was constructed in 1961 and was greatly expanded and renovated in 2003. It houses Gonzaga's biology and chemistry programs, Gonzaga's Indian Education Outreach Program, and a greenhouse.

13 JEPSON CENTER  

Constructed in 1987, the Jepson Center doubled its space in 2004 with the addition of the Hogan wing. Jepson is home to the School of Business Administration, the Gonzaga Institute for Ethics, and the Hogan Entrepreneurial Leadership Program.

14 JUNDT ART CENTER AND MUSEUM  

Opened in 1995, the Jundt Center houses Gonzaga's art department and includes studios for painting, drawing, printmaking, and ceramics. The Jundt Art Museum features the Jundt Galleries, the Arcade Gallery, and the Chancellor's Room, which showcases an 800-piece blown glass chandelier by world-renowned glass artist Dale Chihuly. The Museum displays traveling exhibits and pieces from Gonzaga's growing permanent collection of art, including works by Rodin, Rembrandt, Goya, and Picasso.

15 LAW SCHOOL  

Completed in 2000 along the banks of the beautiful Spokane River, the law school accommodates more than 600 students, faculty, and administration. The building houses the Chastek Law Library, the Barbieri Courtroom – with seating for 200 people – and a chapel. It also houses the Center for Law and Justice, which serves the needs of many indigent and marginalized peoples in the Inland Northwest.

16 MCCARTHEY ATHLETIC CENTER  

Home to the Gonzaga men's and women's basketball teams, the McCarthy Athletic Center seats 6000 people. It also hosts special events, concerts, performances, and presentations. Built in 2004, it is the largest athletic center in the West Coast Conference. The MAC includes a large workout space for the University crew teams. The athletic department's external relations offices are located here.

17 MARTIN CENTRE  

Built in 1965 as the Kennedy Pavilion, and expanded in 1987 as the Martin Centre, this 2,000-seat pavilion is now home to Gonzaga volleyball and numerous other community events. The Rudolf Fitness Center includes a swimming pool, indoor running track, weight-training and cardiovascular workout areas, three basketball/volleyball courts, four racquetball courts, two workout studios, and a juice bar. The primary administrative and non-basketball coaches' offices of the athletic department are housed here.

18 MONAGHAN MANSION/ MUSIC BUILDING

Built in 1901 as a residence for James Monaghan, an early supporter of Gonzaga and St. Aloysius Church, it was considered one of the finest homes north of the Spokane River. The mansion was acquired by the University in 1944 as a music conservatory and has served as the home of the music department ever since.

19 ROSAUER CENTER  

Constructed in 1995, the building consolidated the School of Education into one building. It contains four media-equipped classrooms and the University's only Macintosh computer lab.

20 RUSSELL THEATRE  

Built in 1906 as an addition to the Administration Building, this facility served as the University gymnasium prior to the construction of Kennedy Pavilion (Martin Centre) in 1965. It was then remodeled as a general theatre and is now used primarily by the theatre arts program. It is the location of numerous student drama presentations every year.

21 ST. ALOYSIUS CHURCH 

While this 1911 Catholic Church serves primarily St. Aloysius Parish, it is operated by the Oregon Province of Jesuit priests and has been adopted by the Gonzaga Community as its church, too. In addition to daily services, it is the site of Gonzaga's Mass of the Holy Spirit at the start of every academic year, the University Choir's annual Christmas Concert, and numerous other University events.

22 SCHOENBERG CENTER  

Shaped like a teepee and constructed along the Spokane River in 1968 through the efforts of Gonzaga archivist Father Wilfred Schoenberg, S.J., this facility was created as the Museum of Native American Art and Culture. In the early 1990s the artifacts were turned over to Spokane's Northwest Museum of Arts and Culture, and the building has since become home to the School of Professional Studies.

23 UNITY HOUSE

Home of the Multicultural Education Resource Center, this is a community gathering place for open dialogue regarding racial, cultural, and social justice issues for all members of the GU community. The offices for the Spokane chapter of the NAACP are located here.
